

LBCCG successful with Community Action Grant — “Restoring Bridge Creek”

In the latest round of Community Action Grants funding announced in July 2012, LBCCG has once again been successful with the project Restoring Bridge Creek—A Partnership of the Commonwealth, State and Community.

with area mapped as Essential Habitat for threatened species by the Department of Environment and Resource Management and includes habitat for vulnerable populations of Macadamia and Syzygium species.

Last year LBCCG was successful in an application for neighbouring properties (Upper Lawley Creek Restoration) which fenced and revegetated 560 metres of watercourse and planted 3,200 trees. This new project is a perfect addition to last year’s project.

LBCCG has now been successful receiving Community Action Grant funding four years in a row highlighting our ability to establish partnerships and implement projects that deliver not only water quality benefits but broader environmental outcomes. Our brand of catchment care and engagement of landholders continues to lead the way in on-ground projects

The project will fence and revegetate 380 metres of a Bridge Creek tributary, establishing a vegetation corridor between remnant rainforest vegetation and a wetland on the outskirts of urban Maleny.

The project will address poor water quality in Lake Baroon (the Sunshine Coast’s most important water supply) from grazing, erosion, sedimentation, urban development, habitat fragmentation, biodiversity decline and weed spread.
